# A Word from the Pastor for Advent, Christmas, and the New Year.

We are about to finish one year and begin another. The Church Year begins on December 1 with Advent, and of course, our calendar year comes to a close on the  $31^{\rm st}$ .

But what happens between those two dates is amazing. Advent is the season of expectation, of anticipation, as we wait for the birth of the Christ child, the word that our light has come. We change over to Year A with Matthew's gospel, where in Advent, we are reminded to watch for the second coming of Christ. Matthew then moves on to John the Baptist with his announcements and his doubts about "the one who is to come."

"Marguerite Higgins was a correspondent during the Korean conflict. One bitter winter's day, she began interviewing a muddy Marine who had just returned from a grueling battle.

As he opened a tin can of C-rations and began eating, Higgins said to the young man, "If I could give you anything in the world you wanted, what would you ask for?"

The Marine thought for a moment and then said, "Give me tomorrow."

It's what the prophets promise us during Advent."

Tomorrow does come and we ring in Christmas. Christ is born, and all is made new! Christmas is the shortest season of the church year, with only 12 days to celebrate.

From last year's Christmas Eve:

"Viewing the television cartoon, A Charlie Brown Christmas, is a holiday tradition for many people. A favorite scene is when Linus, standing on a bare stage, recites the story of the birth of Jesus from the gospel of Luke.

That scene nearly didn't make it into the show. TV network executives thought it too religious, and the reading from Luke simply too lengthy. But the producers persisted, the scene stayed and it became a cherished moment.

There's one feature of that scene that not many people notice. Just before Linus begins his recitation, he drops his security blanket.

Anyone who's familiar with the character of Linus knows he's never without his blanket. Over the years of drawing his comic strip, Charles Schulz would occasionally deprive Linus of his blanket... Every time this happens, this otherwise cool, calm and wise-beyond-his-years character dissolves into frenzied angst. Linus simply cannot be without his blanket.

Except in this moment, when he's standing on stage reciting the Christmas story. With the Christ child on his mind, it seems, he doesn't need it."

But Mary and Joseph did not tarry in Bethlehem, and neither do we. Once the Magi visit at Epiphany, we move quickly to the baptism of Jesus, the announcement of who he is. He calls his disciples and it's off to work.

"In their book Spiritual Literacy: Reading the Sacred in Everyday Life, Frederic and Mary Ann Brussat recount the experience of author Frederick Buechner who, in his autobiographical book, Telling Secrets, 'breaks silence about a family secret: how his teenage daughter struggled with anorexia. There came a day when he, himself, was in the pits of despair, worried sick that his daughter would never get well again. But then, in a dark night, came a message of hope, from an unusual quarter.'

Buechner writes: 'I remember sitting parked by the roadside once, terribly depressed and afraid about my daughter's illness and what was going on in our family, when out of nowhere a car came along down the highway with a license plate that bore on it the one word out of all the words in the dictionary I needed most to see exactly then. The word was TRUST. What do you call a moment like that? Something to laugh off as the kind of joke life plays on us every once in a while? The word of God? I am willing to believe that maybe it was something of both, but for me it was an epiphany. The owner of the car turned out to be, as I suspected, a trust officer in a bank, and not long ago, having read an account I wrote of the incident somewhere, he found out where I lived and one afternoon brought me the license plate itself, which sits propped up on a bookshelf in my house to this day. It is rusty around the edges and a little battered, and it is also as holy a relic as I have ever seen."

There is so much going on...and my hope is that you will slow down and enjoy the anticipation of Advent, the joy of Christmas, and whatever Epiphany will unveil to you. A blessed Holiday season!
